Dear Valued Customer,

Thank you for your inquiry regarding Eaton compliance with the provisions of Section 1502 of the Dodd-Frank Act (the "Act") pertaining to the use of tin, coltan, tungsten and gold, as well as derivatives thereof and any other mineral or its derivatives determined by the United States Secretary of State ("Designated Minerals") originating from the Democratic Republic of Congo and neighboring countries ("DRC").

Eaton fully supports the intent of the Act and seeks only to use Designated Minerals that are sourced from conflict-free sources. To this end, Eaton has implemented processes within our supply chain, in an effort to determine the country of origin of any Designated Minerals used in our products. And while we currently are unaware of any Designated Minerals we use that have originated in a conflict zone of the DRC, due to our position as a downstream manufacturer many tiers removed from the smelters or source mines, we do not have sufficient information to conclusively determine the countries of origin, chain of custody, or specific smelters of Designated Minerals, if any, in our products.
